





The Brethren Movement

The term "brethren" means "brothers" and was an early description of Christians in the first Cent. AD.

The modern Brethren movement began in Great Britain in the early 19th. Cent. when individual Christians sought to return to the New Testament principles and practices of church life, with emphasis on the Scriptural doctrine of the priesthood of all believers, the authority and reliability of the Bible, a personal faith in Jesus, and an open fellowship at the Lord's table.

In the 1840's the Brethren movement split into "Exclusive" and "Open" Brethren-the former demanding stricter requirements for membership in the fellowship.

Singapore Brethren from 1864

The Brethren work in Singaproe was started by an English merchant, Philip Robinson, who arrived here from Australia in 1857, and founded the well-known Robinsons Company.

The first Brethren church gathered at 108 Bencoolen St. in 1864 for worship and Gospel services; 2



years later in 1866 a building was put up at Bras Basah Road named Bethesda Chapel. The present form of Bethesda (Bras Basah) Gospel Hall resulted from the rebuilding of the original chapel.

100 years later - 1964

The Brethren expanded and set up congregations in Neil Rd (New Bridge Rd. Chapel), Katong, Yio Chu Kang, Geylang, Frankel and Bukit Panjang, and by

1964 during its centenary there were 7 English-speaking con gregations, 5 Chinese-speaking and 2 Malay-speaking with an estimated total membership of 1600. Attached to some of these assemblies were 11 Sunday Schools with an estimated enrolment of 2,000 students.

Since that date several new congregations have been established and the present Brethren congregations are: Ang Mo Kio, Angora, Bedok Mission House, Bras Basah, Bukit Arang, Bukit Panjang, Clementi, Exodus, Frankel Estate, Geylang, Jalan Rama Rama, Katong, Pasir Panjang Hill Serangoon and Yio Chu Kang.

Directions

Mission House from 1882

The Mission house at 417 New Bridge Road (Neil Road Gospel Hall) was built in 1882 for "missionaries passing through the port and also to serve as a residence for any missionary labouring in Singapore in connection with the Gospel work at Bethesda". Mr Alexander Grant, a permanent resident missionary who had formerly been in China as a missionary of the Presbyterian Church, was the first occupant

to move into the house on July 20, 1882. Mr Grant was a fluent speaker of the Chinese Hokkien dialect

Pre-war years

The Mission house was a haven of rest for scores of passing and resident missionaries over its past 100 years. Tradition has it-that Hudson Taylor stayed there on more than one occasion.

When missionaries were driven out of China during the Boxer Rising and later in 1936 and when China closed its doors to missionaries in 1948, countless servants of the Lord found the

Mission house truly a place of refuge and rest.

For many years a Sunday School was carried on in the dining-room of the Mission house. However in 1936, a house at 155 Neil Road was rented to conduct Gospel meetings in English, Chinese and Malay. Miss Gladys Grigg, a missionary from UK, occupied the house until the Fall of Singapore. The meetings were stopped with the Japanese occupation and re-started in 1947 at the Mission house. There was a worship service, a Sunday School and Gospel meetings conducted in English. That year also saw the beginnings of the Malay-speaking (Pernakan) assembly. Mr and Mrs Matt Finlay, missionaries from New Zealand occupied the Mission house form Jan. 1947 together with Miss Grigg.

1960's

The 1960's saw the flourishing of youth and children's work at

Neil Road Gospel Hall.

In 1959 a Sister Mrs Chiang Hong Thian of the Malay Assembly left a sum of money upon her death for the enlargement and repairs of the Gospel Hall, thus increasing its seating capacity to nearly 200 persons.

Later that year a change in the Government policy disallowing the use of school buildings for Sunday Schools, affected 3 Sunday Schools in the district (namely Tiong Bahru, Redhill and Nelson) which shifted into the

newly-expanded Neil Rd. Gospel Hall.

The church thus had "full house" every Sunday with the Lord's Supper in English followed by the Malay (Pernakan) assembly in the morning; then Nelson Sunday School, followed by the Tiong Bahru Sunday School, the Junior Sunday School and the Senior Sunday School in the afternoon, ending with the English Gospel service in English in the late evening.

The English-speaking congregation was made up largely of young people (below 20) and the Malay-speaking of the elderly (above 50). Evidences of the youthful congregation were seen in the emergence of the "Overcomers" youth group in the early '60's and the "Bukit Ho Swee Mission" in the mid-60's. The church was still a branch assembly of Bethesda Bras Basah and not yet fully autonomous. It was led by "Responsible Brethren" appointed by the Bras Basah Elders. In mid 1966 Neil Road Gospel Hall became a fully autonomous local church.

1970's

The 1970's saw the beginnings of housechurches. The church (re-named New Bridge Road Chapel) having gained its autonomy was now faced with the challenge of having to move out from its existing premises at the expiry of its lease in Nov. 1979.

Led by a youthful leadership it determined to branch out into small housechurches over the remaining

period of its stay at NBRC.

This saw the development of 4 housechurches from 1974 — 1977 namely Holland Rd Chapel in 1974 (re-named Exodus), Dover and Angora in 1975, Gideon in 1977 and Living Hope in 1978. During that period of development the total membership increased fron 100 to nearly 400.

But by end 1978 because of the need for consolidation and leadership problems, the churches decided that there should be no more new housechurches. Meanwhile Gideon and Dover Chapels had merged and were called Clementi, and Living Hope Chapel after about 2 years of existence returned to New Bridge Rd. Chapel in 1979.

PPH Chapel from 1977

At the end of 1977 Grace Methodist Church offered for sale its parsonage at 3 Pasir Panjang Hill. After much prayer and consultations the price was nego tiated at \$170,000. But unsettled matters on the part of the Methodists delayed the sale for nearly 1½ years. It was finally completed in March 1979. This delay was costly.


The first estimate in June 1977 of \$690,000 for the building project drastically increased to \$900,000 by the time tenders were called in March 1980.

The PPH building project made it needful for manpower and resources from all the chapels to be marshalled for the mammoth task. In 1978 when the decision was taken to build the chapel, the 4 existing congregations had about 400 members, of whom over 70% were students. The average age of the members was 22. The church's closest experience to building was the purchase of its Angora Close house in Dec 1975 at a comparatively paltry sum of \$131,000.

However if funds appeared to be lacking, the Lord God had provided for the occasion men with the necessary experiences in their secular jobs for the building project.

The Combined Building Committee with its Technical, Financial and Promotions sub-committees went into full swing from the word "go". In mid 1980 revised building plans (scaled down from the more elaborate Methodists') had been approved, the building contractor selected and a total of nearly \$300,000 raised.

Almost immediately after the tender documents were signed the building industry in Singapore underwent an



accelerated period of price hikes brought about by several economic factors, including shortage of labour and materials which for the next 2 years were to be the major cause in delaying the completion of the building project.

The project tested the faith of the believers to trust God to provide the impossible sum of \$1 million. It also tested the durability and mettle of the leaders. The core leaders held up to some trying times over the years.

The building project seemed to have 2 diametrically opposing effects on the believers. Many fasted, prayed and gave sacrificially and experienced the blessings of the Lord. Others however were discouraged by the "business" of putting up such an enormous physical building and would have preferred a less pretentious undertaking on a more "spiritual" level.

100 years later — 1982

It is no coincidence that the Mission house was built in July 1882, and the building of PPH Chapel was completed in July 1982 exactly 100 years to the month. Truly it has been the Lord's doing.

It testifies to the fact that the least among us can still be used by God for His glory. In spite of inexperience, of not being well-endowed with worldly possessions and wealth, God came into our midst and moved the mountains of impossibility, so that all may see and know that it is the Lord God Himself who has undertaken for us the impossible and made all things possible.

Chronology

BEGINNINGS: The Lord's work at Mission House 417 New Bridge Road (Neil Road Gospel Hall) from 1882

started in Singapore (pioneered by English merchant Philip Robinson) at 108 Bencoolen St. and 2 years later at 77 Bras Basah Rd (Bethesda Chapel).

1882 Mission house built at 417 New Bridge Road; first occupied by missionary Alexander Grant on July 20th.

Prewar years

Mission house was rest house for many of the Lord's servants; Sunday School functioned in dining-room.

1936 Rented house at 155 Neil Road was used to conduct Gospel meetings in English, Chinese and Malay. House occupied by Miss Gladys Grigg missionary from U.K. Work stopped during Japanese occupation.



1947 Work re-started in Mission house (Neil Rd. Gospel Hall) with full congregation, Sunday School and Gospel meetings in English. Mr and Mrs M. Finlay, New Zealand missionaries occupied Mission house together with Miss Grigg. Malay (Pernakan) work started with Bible study group and prayer. Leaders included Mr Lee Teow Poh, Mr Thien Yan Soon, Mr Oh Teow Suan and Miss Grigg.

1951 Mr Charlie Tan commended by Bethesda Bras Basah to full time Christian ministry.

1959 Extension of Neil Rd. Gospel Hall to hold 200 persons coinci ding with change in Government policy disallowing use of school buildings for Sunday School work, affecting Tiong Bahru, Nelson, Redhill Sunday Schools. which shifted into the church. The period saw flourishing of Sunday School work under Superintendents M. Finlay, Harry Tan, Charlie Tan, Tommy Cheong and Richard Chia: "Overcomers" youth ministry under leadership of Charlie Tan, Edwin Goh, Richard Chia, Tan Yew Jin, Tham Siew Kiong, Loi Tat Kai.

1960 Responsible Brethren committee (M. Finlay, Charlie Tan, Richard Chia, C. McSkimming, Warwick Neville and Dr. W. Hamilton) appointed by Bethesda Bras Basah elders, led Neil Rd. Gospel Hall still a branch assembly of Bethesda.

Bukit Ho Swee Mission inaugurated by Lawrence Chua, Stephen Chua, Chwee Heng Chooi, Johnny Nah, Yeo Siew Khim, Pauline Han, Rosalind Chung and Ong Bee Choo. Ministry included free tuition, tracting, Bible study, social work for children in Bukit Ho Swee area. In 1968 BHSM leaders included Lawrence Chua, Peter Tan, Chan Yau Seng, Chng Buck Chwee, and Errol Oh.

Neil Rd. Gospel Hall became fully autonomous church; re-named New Bridge Rd. Gospel Hall. During this period, Miss Grigg and later the Finlays returned to their home countries after over 30 years of missionary service.

Mission Policy

The Mission Policy of the Church reflects the Church's concern for the ministry of outreach at home and abroad. As much as "where there is no vision the people perish" so "where there is no mission the Church will die." The backbone of Church growth and existence lies in the obedience of the church to her Lord's command "Go and make disciples of all nations" (Matt 28:19, 20).

Enshrined in this Command is the compassion of our Lord. He looks upon men as sheep without a shepherd and He invites all men to "come unto me" desiring "all men should be saved and none should come under condemnation." The hurch that enjoys His salvation, has the imperative task of making that same salvation known to the world at large.

The Source of Mission

The source of mission is the nature and eternal purpose of the tri-une God

- the Father who sent His Son to be the Saviour of the world (1 John 4:14)
- the Son whose dedication to mission is our model, whose finished work of salvation is our message and whose Great Commission is our mandate (Jn 4:34; 1 Cor 15:1-7; Matt 28:18-20)
- the Holy Spirit who is sent into believers, and who sets apart and sends out messengers of the Gospel (Gal 4:4 Acts 1:8; 13:2, 4)

The Scope of the Mission

The scope of the mission is both global and local: the Christian Church must proclaim the Gospel throughout the whole world (Mk 16:15; Lk 24:46, 47) and local churches have the two-fold responsibility of witnessing to Christ in their immediate neighbourhoods and nation as well as in regions beyond (Matt 24:14; Acts 1:8; 1 Thess 1:7, 8).

The Goal of this Mission

The goal of this mission is the glorification of God, through loving obedience to Christ's Great Commission in:

- the proclamation of the Gospel evangelization (Mk 16:15);
- the baptism and instruction of converts discipling (Matt 28:19, 20);
- the consolidation of believers in the body of Christ

 fellowship and growth (Jn 15:5, 8; Col 1:28; Eph
 4:11-16).

The Message of this Mission

The message of this mission is the Gospel of Christ and "the whole counsel of God" found in the God-inspired Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments (Acts 20:27, 32; 2 Tim 3:16, 17; Jn 16:13, 14), and centred in God's final Word to mankind, Jesus Christ, through whose atoning death and triumphant resurrection God was reconciling the World to Himself and offers salvation to all people through personal repentance and faith in Christ, who shall come again for His people and to judge the world (Heb 1:1-3; 2 Cor 5:14-19; Acts 17:30, 31).

The Mission Emphasis

The mission emphasis of the church will be as follows:

- to raise full-time church workers/ministers/pastors who will provide the pastoral care and teaching needs of the church for the upbuilding of the church
- to raise full-time workers who will be sent out to the mission fields. The worker may be seconded to a Christian mission organization to work in an approved mission field identified by the church.
- to train/develop potential full-time church workers and workers for the mission field.

Worker-Church Partnership

The practical fellowship between the worker and the Church is based on the following principles of mutual concern and trust:

- the Church in dependence on God has an obligation to recognise the worker as a servant of the Lord, to pray for his training and ministry, and to provide adequately for his material sustenance and welfare in exercise of faithful stewardship (1Cor. 9:4-14; 1 Tim. 5:17, 18)
- the missionary, also in dependence on God has a responsibility to consult the leaders of the local church regarding his sphere of service, to perform his duties conscientiously and to report to the congregation regularly through the Combined Mission Board about his work. It is left to him whether to accept or forego any part of the church's financial provision for his needs, depending on his own conviction and other sources of income (1Cor. 9:15; 1 Thess. 2:9; Acts 20:33-35; Phil. 4:10-19)
